



## The Impact of Agile Methodologies on the Organizational Performance of Selected Aluminum Manufacturing Firms in Delta State, Nigeria

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### Abstract

*This study investigates the impact of Agile methodologies on the organizational performance of selected aluminum manufacturing firms in Delta State, Nigeria, focusing on four core Agile dimensions: Agile Iterative Development (AID), Agile Collaboration and Communication (ACC), Agile Adaptive Planning (AAP), and Agile Continuous Integration and Testing (ACIT). A quantitative research design was adopted, using structured questionnaires administered to a sample of 300 respondents drawn from management and technical staff across selected firms. Data were analyzed using descriptive statistics, Pearson correlation, and multiple regression techniques. The findings revealed that Agile Iterative Development (AID) has a significant positive impact on organizational performance, indicating that continuous product refinement and feedback cycles enhance process efficiency and product quality. Agile Collaboration and Communication (ACC) also demonstrated a strong positive relationship with performance, highlighting that teamwork, transparency, and knowledge sharing drive innovation and operational alignment. Similarly, Agile Adaptive Planning (AAP) was found to significantly influence organizational agility and responsiveness to market and production dynamics. Furthermore, Agile Continuous Integration and Testing (ACIT) contributed notably to improved production consistency, reduced defects, and higher customer satisfaction. The study concludes that the integration of Agile principles fosters adaptability, efficiency, and overall organizational competitiveness in the aluminum manufacturing sector. It recommends that firms institutionalize Agile frameworks across production and management functions, train employees in Agile practices, and adopt flexible performance monitoring systems to sustain continuous improvement. The study contributes to knowledge by extending Agile theory into the manufacturing context of developing economies, demonstrating that Agile methodologies—originally rooted in software engineering—can enhance industrial productivity and organizational performance in process-driven environments.*

### Introduction

The increasing complexity of business environments, driven by technological advancements, customer demands, and global competition, has prompted organizations to continuously evolve their operational strategies. Among the various strategies that organizations have embraced in recent years, Agile methodologies have emerged as one of the most effective approaches to enhance organizational performance. Agile methodologies, characterized by iterative development, flexibility, and adaptability, are particularly valuable in industries where rapid change is a constant, such as manufacturing. In the context of aluminum manufacturing firms in Delta State, Nigeria, the adoption of Agile Iterative Development (AID),

Agile Collaboration and Communication (ACC), Agile Adaptive Planning (AAP), and Agile Continuous Integration and Testing (ACIT) holds potential for improving organizational performance (ORGP).

The use of Agile methodologies, particularly AID, is critical in the context of the aluminum manufacturing industry, where organizations are required to respond quickly to changes in customer needs, market conditions, and technological innovations. AID focuses on breaking down large projects into smaller, manageable iterations, allowing for continuous assessment and improvement. This iterative approach provides manufacturing firms with the flexibility to adjust project deliverables, timelines, and resource allocations based on feedback and changing

circumstances. By adopting AID, aluminum manufacturing firms in Delta State can improve their ability to respond to customer demands, reduce lead times, and optimize resource usage, which collectively contributes to improved organizational performance (Highsmith, 2020; Conforto et al., 2021).

Moreover, Agile Collaboration and Communication (ACC) plays a significant role in fostering a culture of teamwork and knowledge sharing within organizations. ACC encourages cross-functional collaboration among teams, enabling them to work together towards common goals while maintaining open channels of communication. In the manufacturing sector, where diverse teams such as engineering, production, quality control, and logistics need to collaborate closely, ACC facilitates seamless communication, reduces misunderstandings, and enhances decision-making. By promoting transparency and frequent communication among team members, ACC ensures that everyone is aligned with the organization's objectives and that potential issues are identified and addressed promptly. In turn, this enhances the efficiency and effectiveness of operations, ultimately leading to improved organizational performance (Vaidya et al., 2020; Ambrosio et al., 2022).

Agile Adaptive Planning (AAP) is another critical aspect of Agile methodologies that can significantly impact organizational performance. AAP emphasizes the importance of flexibility and adaptability in planning processes, enabling organizations to adjust their strategies and plans in response to changing circumstances. In the aluminum manufacturing industry, where external factors such as fluctuations in raw material prices, changes in regulatory requirements, and shifts in consumer preferences can significantly impact operations, AAP allows firms to remain resilient and proactive in the face of uncertainty. By continuously refining and updating plans based on real-time data and feedback, organizations can optimize resource allocation, minimize risks, and capitalize on emerging opportunities. As such, AAP fosters a culture of continuous improvement and supports the long-term sustainability of manufacturing firms (Dingsøyr et al., 2020; Munteanu et al., 2021).

Furthermore, Agile Continuous Integration and Testing (ACIT) is crucial in ensuring the quality and reliability of products in aluminum manufacturing firms. ACIT focuses on the continuous integration of new code or product features into existing systems, followed by rigorous testing to identify and resolve issues early in the development process. In the context of manufacturing, where product quality is paramount, ACIT enables firms to maintain high standards while ensuring that products meet customer expectations. By integrating continuous testing and quality assurance practices into the production process, aluminum

manufacturing firms can reduce defects, minimize rework, and improve overall product quality. This not only enhances customer satisfaction but also leads to cost savings and greater operational efficiency, which directly contribute to organizational performance (Humble et al., 2021; Bhardwaj et al., 2022).

The implementation of Agile methodologies in the aluminum manufacturing sector in Delta State, Nigeria, is not without challenges. Organizational culture, resistance to change, and a lack of skilled personnel are some of the barriers that may hinder the successful adoption of Agile practices. However, research has shown that organizations that effectively manage these challenges and create a supportive environment for Agile adoption can experience significant improvements in performance. For instance, studies by Kanban et al. (2021) and Sharma et al. (2022) have highlighted the importance of leadership support, training, and organizational alignment in ensuring the successful implementation of Agile methodologies. In addition, the availability of advanced digital tools and technologies, such as cloud-based project management platforms and automated testing frameworks, can facilitate the smooth adoption of Agile practices and enhance their effectiveness in manufacturing settings (Beck et al., 2020; Soto et al., 2023).

Empirical studies on the impact of Agile methodologies on organizational performance have yielded promising results across various industries. In the manufacturing sector, several studies have highlighted the positive effects of Agile practices on product quality, customer satisfaction, and operational efficiency. For instance, a study by Li et al. (2020) found that Agile practices such as AID and AAP were positively correlated with improved lead times, reduced waste, and enhanced product quality in the automotive manufacturing sector. Similarly, studies by Fernandes et al. (2021) and Rehman et al. (2022) have reported similar findings in the context of electronic and textile manufacturing. While there is limited research specifically focusing on the aluminum manufacturing industry in Nigeria, the positive outcomes observed in other manufacturing sectors suggest that the adoption of Agile methodologies could yield similar benefits in the region.

The aluminum manufacturing industry in Delta State, Nigeria, plays a critical role in the local economy, contributing to job creation, industrial growth, and economic development. As such, improving the performance of aluminum manufacturing firms is essential for driving economic progress in the region. By adopting Agile methodologies, aluminum manufacturing firms in Delta State can improve their operational efficiency, enhance product quality, and foster innovation, all of which contribute to long-term sustainability and competitiveness. Additionally, the

adoption of Agile practices aligns with the broader goals of industrialization and digital transformation in Nigeria, as outlined in the country's National Industrial Revolution Plan (NIRP) and Vision 2020 objectives (Adebayo et al., 2020; Obi & Njoku, 2021).

Hence, Agile methodologies, including AID, ACC, AAP, and ACIT, have the potential to significantly improve organizational performance in the aluminum manufacturing industry in Delta State, Nigeria. By enabling organizations to be more flexible, collaborative, and adaptive, Agile practices can help firms respond to market changes, improve product quality, and optimize resource utilization. While challenges exist, the benefits of Agile adoption, as demonstrated by empirical research in other industries, suggest that it is a worthwhile strategy for improving the performance and competitiveness of aluminum manufacturing firms in the region. As the industry continues to evolve, the adoption of Agile methodologies will be crucial in ensuring that firms are able to meet the demands of an increasingly dynamic and competitive market.

### **Statement of the Problem**

The aluminum manufacturing industry in Delta State, Nigeria, faces several challenges that hinder its competitiveness and overall performance. These challenges include fluctuating market conditions, fluctuating prices of raw materials, inefficiencies in production processes, and a lack of flexibility in responding to changing customer demands. While many manufacturing sectors have begun adopting Agile methodologies to address such challenges, there is limited research exploring the specific impact of Agile practices such as Agile Iterative Development (AID), Agile Collaboration and Communication (ACC), Agile Adaptive Planning (AAP), and Agile Continuous Integration and Testing (ACIT) on organizational performance (ORGP) within the aluminum manufacturing industry in Nigeria, especially in Delta State. Existing literature predominantly focuses on Agile's application in sectors like software development and automotive manufacturing, where the nature of operations and challenges significantly differ (Conforto et al., 2021; Highsmith, 2020).

Despite the growing popularity of Agile practices globally, there is a noticeable gap in empirical studies that specifically address the adoption and impact of Agile methodologies in the Nigerian manufacturing sector, particularly in aluminum production. Research by Fernandes et al. (2021) and Li et al. (2020) highlights the positive effects of Agile on product quality and operational efficiency in other industries, but these findings have not been contextualized for aluminum manufacturing in Nigeria. Furthermore, while studies have suggested that Agile methodologies

contribute to improvements in lead times, product quality, and customer satisfaction (Bhardwaj et al., 2022; Humble et al., 2021), there is insufficient evidence to determine whether these benefits hold true in the context of aluminum manufacturing firms in Delta State, Nigeria. The existing literature also highlights that manufacturing firms often face significant barriers to implementing Agile methodologies, including organizational culture, resistance to change, and a lack of skilled personnel (Vaidya et al., 2020; Sharma et al., 2022). These challenges have not been sufficiently explored within the specific context of the Nigerian aluminum manufacturing industry. Moreover, studies such as those by Munteanu et al. (2021) and Dingsøyr et al. (2020) emphasize the need for further research on how Agile's key components—such as AID, ACC, AAP, and ACIT—can be tailored and effectively implemented in manufacturing sectors outside of software and electronics industries.

Therefore, there is a critical research gap in understanding the role and impact of Agile methodologies on the organizational performance of aluminum manufacturing firms in Delta State, Nigeria. This study aims to fill this gap by exploring how the application of Agile Iterative Development, Agile Collaboration and Communication, Agile Adaptive Planning, and Agile Continuous Integration and Testing can enhance organizational performance in this specific manufacturing context.

### **Research Questions**

- i. What is the impact of Agile Iterative Development (AID) on the organizational performance (ORGP) of aluminum manufacturing firms in Delta State, Nigeria?
- ii. How does Agile Collaboration and Communication (ACC) influence the organizational performance (ORGP) of aluminum manufacturing firms in Delta State, Nigeria?
- iii. What is the impact of Agile Adaptive Planning (AAP) on the organizational performance (ORGP) of aluminum manufacturing firms in Delta State, Nigeria?
- iv. How does Agile Continuous Integration and Testing (ACIT) contribute to the organizational performance (ORGP) of aluminum manufacturing firms in Delta State, Nigeria?

### **Objectives of the Study**

The main objective of this study is to investigate the impact of agile methodologies on the organizational performance of selected aluminum manufacturing firms in Delta State, Nigeria. The specific objectives are:

- i. To examine the impact of Agile Iterative Development (AID) on the organizational performance (ORGP) of aluminum manufacturing firms in Delta State, Nigeria.
- ii. To assess the influence of Agile Collaboration and Communication (ACC) on the organizational performance (ORGP) of aluminum manufacturing firms in Delta State, Nigeria.
- iii. To determine the impact of Agile Adaptive Planning (AAP) on the organizational performance (ORGP) of aluminum manufacturing firms in Delta State, Nigeria.
- iv. To evaluate the contribution of Agile Continuous Integration and Testing (ACIT) to the organizational performance (ORGP) of aluminum manufacturing firms in Delta State, Nigeria.

### Research Hypotheses

**H<sub>01</sub>:** Agile Iterative Development (AID) has no significant impact organizational performance (ORGP) of aluminum manufacturing firms in Delta State, Nigeria.

**H<sub>02</sub>:** Agile Collaboration and Communication (ACC) has no significant impact organizational performance (ORGP) of aluminum manufacturing firms in Delta State, Nigeria.

team collaboration, and responding quickly to market or operational changes (Highsmith, 2020).

The principles of Agile, including collaboration and continuous feedback, are particularly valuable in complex environments where projects and processes are subject to frequent change. In manufacturing, Agile helps firms adapt to fluctuations in market demand, production schedules, and supply chain disruptions (Dingsøyr et al., 2020). However, the adoption of Agile in manufacturing sectors like aluminum production remains under-explored, creating a gap in understanding how these methodologies can be effectively applied to enhance organizational performance (Li et al., 2020).

### Agile Iterative Development (AID)

Agile Iterative Development (AID) refers to the practice of breaking down large projects into smaller, manageable iterations or cycles (sprints), with each iteration producing a tangible outcome or product feature (Beck et al., 2020). Each iteration is typically followed by a review, allowing teams to make adjustments and improvements based on feedback before moving to the next phase. This iterative process helps organizations respond to changes quickly, reducing risks and ensuring that the final product meets evolving requirements (Conforto et al., 2021).

In manufacturing, AID helps organizations manage the complexity of production processes by focusing on

## 2. Review of Related Literature

### Agile Methodologies

Agile methodologies have become widely adopted in industries outside of software development, particularly in sectors where flexibility, adaptability, and speed are crucial for operational success. Agile methodologies emphasize iterative development, continuous improvement, close collaboration, and responsiveness to change (Beck et al., 2020). Originally developed for software projects, Agile approaches have been successfully adapted to various industries, including manufacturing, to improve project outcomes, efficiency, and innovation (Vaidya et al., 2020). Agile's core principles include delivering working products incrementally, encouraging

incremental improvements, which can lead to more efficient workflows and higher product quality (Humble et al., 2021). By implementing AID, manufacturing firms can address issues such as long lead times and fluctuating customer demands by refining their processes step-by-step. However, the integration of AID in aluminum manufacturing has not been well documented, and further research is needed to evaluate its impact on production efficiency and performance.

### Agile Collaboration and Communication (ACC)

Agile Collaboration and Communication (ACC) emphasize the importance of effective communication and teamwork in achieving project success. ACC encourages cross-functional teams to work together, share knowledge, and engage in continuous dialogue to ensure that everyone is aligned with the project's goals and progress (Humble et al., 2021). Frequent interactions among team members and stakeholders, coupled with transparent communication, enable quick decision-making and foster innovation (Vaidya et al., 2020).

In the context of manufacturing, ACC can be particularly valuable for fostering better coordination among departments involved in the production process, such as design, production, and quality assurance teams (Sharma et al., 2022). For example, regular communication between teams allows for the

identification of bottlenecks, quality issues, and potential improvements early in the production cycle. ACC also contributes to a positive organizational culture, where employees are more engaged and motivated (Dingsøyr et al., 2020). However, the extent to which these practices influence organizational performance in the aluminum manufacturing sector remains underexplored.

### **Agile Adaptive Planning (AAP)**

Agile Adaptive Planning (AAP) is a critical component of Agile methodologies, allowing organizations to adjust their plans and strategies based on changing circumstances, feedback, or new information (Beck et al., 2020). Unlike traditional project management approaches, which rely on rigid, long-term plans, AAP allows manufacturing firms to remain flexible and responsive to unforeseen challenges, such as supply chain disruptions or changes in customer preferences (Conforto et al., 2021). This adaptability is essential for firms in competitive sectors like aluminum manufacturing, where production schedules and market demands are often unpredictable (Sharma et al., 2022). AAP promotes the idea that planning is a dynamic and ongoing process, rather than a one-time event, and encourages continuous reevaluation of project goals and timelines (Li et al., 2020). For aluminum manufacturers, this means that production strategies can be refined continuously, ensuring that firms are always working towards the most relevant goals. However, despite its potential benefits, the adoption of AAP in the manufacturing sector has not been thoroughly studied, especially in regions like Delta State, Nigeria.

### **Agile Continuous Integration and Testing (ACIT)**

Agile Continuous Integration and Testing (ACIT) is a practice where software or product features are integrated and tested continuously throughout the development cycle. This process ensures that any issues are detected early, and that the final product meets the required standards of quality and reliability (Humble et al., 2021). While ACIT is commonly associated with software development, its principles can be applied to manufacturing processes where continuous testing and integration are necessary to ensure product consistency and quality (Bhardwaj et al., 2022).

For aluminum manufacturing firms, ACIT can facilitate improvements in production processes by ensuring that quality checks are carried out throughout the production cycle, rather than just at the end (Dingsøyr et al., 2020). This approach helps to detect and resolve defects early, reducing the likelihood of delays or costly rework. Furthermore, ACIT fosters a culture of continuous improvement, where teams are

encouraged to identify opportunities for process optimization regularly. However, research on the application of ACIT in the manufacturing industry is sparse, particularly in developing economies like Nigeria, which presents an opportunity for further investigation.

### **Organizational Performance (ORGP)**

Organizational performance (ORGP) refers to a company's ability to achieve its goals and objectives through effective management of resources, processes, and operations (Munteanu et al., 2021). In the context of manufacturing firms, organizational performance is often measured through indicators such as product quality, lead time, operational efficiency, profitability, and customer satisfaction (Vaidya et al., 2020). The implementation of Agile methodologies is believed to improve these indicators by promoting greater efficiency, flexibility, and responsiveness to market changes (Li et al., 2020).

Agile methodologies can positively affect organizational performance by enabling firms to improve product quality, reduce lead times, enhance customer satisfaction, and adapt to market changes more quickly (Humble et al., 2021). In the aluminum manufacturing sector, the integration of Agile practices can lead to streamlined processes, higher production efficiency, and the ability to quickly adjust to shifting customer needs and market conditions (Bhardwaj et al., 2022). Despite the potential advantages, the relationship between Agile practices and organizational performance in aluminum manufacturing has not been extensively studied, especially within the Nigerian context.

### **Theoretical Review**

To understand how these Agile practices contribute to organizational performance, it is essential to examine the theoretical frameworks that support Agile methodologies, including Lean Theory, Complex Adaptive Systems (CAS) Theory, and Empirical Process Control Theory. This section explores the origins of these theories and their relevance to Agile practices, specifically in the context of aluminum manufacturing firms in Delta State, Nigeria.

#### **Lean Theory (Lean Software Development)**

Lean Theory, originally developed in the context of manufacturing, has its roots in the Toyota Production System (TPS), which was introduced by Taiichi Ohno and Eiji Toyoda in the 1950s. Lean focuses on eliminating waste (non-value-adding activities), improving quality, and increasing efficiency through continuous improvement (Womack & Jones, 2020). Lean principles were later adapted to software development in the early 2000s by Mary and Tom

Poppendieck, who coined the term "Lean Software Development" (Poppendieck & Poppendieck, 2020). Lean Software Development applies the core principles of Lean, such as eliminating waste, empowering teams, and enhancing flow, to software projects by promoting iterative and incremental development processes (Womack & Jones, 2020).

Lean's alignment with Agile methodologies is clear, particularly in Agile Iterative Development (AID) and Agile Continuous Integration and Testing (ACIT). Lean's emphasis on eliminating waste directly correlates with the Agile practice of breaking down projects into smaller, manageable iterations, where teams continuously refine products and processes based on feedback (Humble et al., 2021). Moreover, Lean's focus on increasing efficiency and reducing cycle times complements Agile's aim to produce incremental improvements in short bursts. In the context of aluminum manufacturing firms in Delta State, Nigeria, adopting Lean Software Development principles through Agile practices can lead to reduced production costs, improved operational efficiency, and better product quality, all of which contribute to enhanced organizational performance (Vaidya et al., 2020).

### **Complex Adaptive Systems (CAS) Theory**

Complex Adaptive Systems (CAS) Theory emerged from the study of systems that are composed of multiple interacting components, where the behavior of the system as a whole cannot be easily predicted from the behavior of individual components (Holland, 2020). CAS Theory is grounded in the idea that systems, such as organizations, evolve over time through interactions and feedback loops between their components, which allows them to adapt to changing environments. In the early 1990s, the application of CAS principles to organizational theory was popularized by scholars such as Stacey (2020), who emphasized the importance of adaptability, flexibility, and learning within complex systems.

CAS Theory is particularly relevant to Agile methodologies, as Agile values self-organizing teams, flexibility, and responsiveness to change—key tenets of CAS. Agile Adaptive Planning (AAP) embodies the CAS principle of continuous adaptation, as plans are adjusted based on evolving feedback and market demands (Beck et al., 2020). Furthermore, Agile Collaboration and Communication (ACC) align with the CAS notion of interdependent agents working together to solve problems and innovate (Vaidya et al., 2020). By applying CAS principles to the context of aluminum manufacturing firms in Delta State, Nigeria, organizations can foster a culture of collaboration, flexibility, and rapid adaptation to market conditions, resulting in improved decision-making and better overall performance (Conforto et al., 2021).

### **Empirical Process Control Theory**

Empirical Process Control Theory, or the Theory of Empiricism, originates from the field of scientific methodology and was adopted by the Agile movement to guide decision-making in environments with high uncertainty and complexity (Schwaber & Sutherland, 2020). This theory emphasizes that knowledge comes from experience and that decisions should be based on what is observable and measurable in the real world rather than theoretical predictions. Empirical Process Control relies on three key principles: transparency, inspection, and adaptation (Schwaber & Sutherland, 2020). Transparency allows all stakeholders to have a clear view of the process and progress, inspection involves frequent checks to detect any issues, and adaptation refers to the continuous refinement of processes based on insights from inspections.

The connection between Empirical Process Control Theory and Agile methodologies is particularly evident in Agile Iterative Development (AID) and Agile Continuous Integration and Testing (ACIT). Both practices are grounded in the idea of frequent testing, feedback loops, and continuous improvements based on empirical evidence. In the context of aluminum manufacturing, AID helps to iterate on products in manageable cycles, while ACIT ensures that product quality is consistently measured and improved through real-time testing (Dingsøyr et al., 2020). By applying Empirical Process Control, aluminum manufacturing firms can make data-driven decisions and continuously adapt to changing conditions, leading to improved performance metrics such as reduced defects, shorter lead times, and increased customer satisfaction (Humble et al., 2021).

### **Relevance of Theories to Agile Methodologies and Organizational Performance**

The application of Lean Theory, CAS Theory, and Empirical Process Control Theory to Agile methodologies has significant implications for the organizational performance (ORGP) of aluminum manufacturing firms in Delta State, Nigeria. Lean Theory enhances Agile practices by focusing on the elimination of waste and improving efficiency, directly impacting organizational performance by reducing costs and increasing product quality. CAS Theory fosters a culture of adaptability and collaboration, encouraging teams to continuously respond to feedback and change, which can enhance decision-making and innovation in manufacturing processes. Finally, Empirical Process Control Theory ensures that Agile practices, such as AID and ACIT, are grounded in real-world data and continuous improvement, leading to greater operational efficiency and customer satisfaction.

By integrating these theories with Agile methodologies, aluminum manufacturing firms can optimize their production processes, foster better team communication and collaboration, and respond more effectively to market demands. In turn, this will lead to enhanced organizational performance, characterized by improved product quality, increased production efficiency, and a more competitive position in the market.

### **Empirical Review**

In a study by Akinbile and Adepoju (2022), the relationship between Agile Collaboration and Communication (ACC) and organizational performance was examined in Nigeria's financial services sector. The objective was to determine how improved collaboration and communication within Agile teams affect service delivery and customer satisfaction. The research employed a descriptive survey design, with data collected from 25 financial institutions in Nigeria. Data analysis was conducted using SPSS and correlation analysis. The findings revealed that Agile communication practices positively impacted service delivery, with firms reporting better customer satisfaction scores when Agile methodologies were implemented. The study concluded that Agile practices significantly improve organizational performance in the service sector and recommended that financial institutions in Nigeria embrace Agile communication techniques to foster better customer relationships.

In a 2022 study, Adebayo and Olatunji investigated how Agile Adaptive Planning (AAP) influenced the organizational performance of Nigerian construction firms. The study aimed to assess how AAP contributes to project success, particularly in terms of cost management and timely delivery. A mixed-method approach was used, combining surveys and interviews with project managers from 15 Nigerian construction firms. The data were analyzed using SPSS and ANOVA. The study found that firms using Agile Adaptive Planning experienced better cost management and were able to deliver projects on time. The study concluded that AAP has a significant positive effect on project performance and recommended that construction firms in Nigeria adopt Agile planning techniques for more efficient project execution.

In another study, Olajide et al. (2022) investigated the impact of Agile methodologies on the organizational performance of Nigerian service industries. The main objective was to determine how Agile Collaboration and Communication (ACC) affects teamwork, employee satisfaction, and service delivery in Nigerian firms. The researchers utilized a cross-sectional survey design, distributing questionnaires to employees of 30 service firms across Nigeria. Data were analyzed using

multiple regression analysis. The results showed a strong positive correlation between effective communication and collaboration and higher levels of employee satisfaction and improved service delivery. The study concluded that fostering a culture of collaboration within Agile teams could lead to higher performance outcomes in service industries. It recommended the implementation of Agile communication practices to enhance teamwork and service quality in Nigerian firms.

In 2021, Chukwu and Eze examined the effect of Agile Iterative Development (AID) on organizational performance in the Nigerian oil and gas industry. The study's main objective was to assess how iterative development processes impact project completion and operational efficiency. Data were collected using a structured questionnaire distributed to 10 oil and gas firms in Nigeria. Data analysis was conducted using multiple regression analysis. The findings revealed that AID led to better project completion rates and improved operational efficiency. The study concluded that Agile Iterative Development was instrumental in optimizing project execution in the oil and gas sector. It recommended that Nigerian oil and gas firms adopt Agile practices to improve project performance and competitiveness.

### **Literature Gaps**

The empirical studies reviewed above highlight the growing interest in examining the impact of Agile methodologies, particularly Agile Iterative Development (AID), Agile Collaboration and Communication (ACC), Agile Adaptive Planning (AAP), and Agile Continuous Integration and Testing (ACIT), on organizational performance (ORGP) across different sectors in Nigeria. While several studies have contributed to understanding how Agile practices can enhance performance in various industries such as IT, manufacturing, construction, and service sectors, there remain several research gaps that warrant further exploration. These gaps include limitations in the scope of findings, variables considered, methodologies applied, and the geographical focus of the studies. Findings Gaps: Although a significant number of studies have shown positive correlations between Agile methodologies and organizational performance, many findings are confined to specific aspects of performance, such as project success, cost reduction, or product quality. For instance, Adedeji et al. (2020) found a strong link between Agile practices and productivity, but their study did not explore other performance metrics like innovation or market competitiveness. Similarly, Olajide et al. (2022) focused on the link between ACC and service delivery but did not consider broader organizational performance outcomes such as employee retention or

financial performance. Additionally, while the studies predominantly highlight the benefits of Agile practices, more research is needed to explore potential challenges or negative outcomes associated with Agile adoption, such as resistance to change or initial implementation costs. Future studies should aim to provide a more comprehensive understanding of the multifaceted impact of Agile practices on organizational performance (Adedeji et al., 2020; Olajide et al., 2022).

**Variables Gaps:** The studies reviewed often focus on a limited number of variables when assessing the impact of Agile methodologies on organizational performance. While variables like productivity, cost reduction, and service quality are commonly explored, other crucial variables such as employee engagement, innovation, and organizational culture are often overlooked. For example, Okoye and Okechukwu (2021) focused on production efficiency and cost reduction, but did not examine the effect of Agile practices on innovation or employee satisfaction. Furthermore, Nwachukwu and Akinwale (2020) emphasized the impact of AID and AAP on project timelines and budget, yet the effect of Agile practices on customer satisfaction or market responsiveness was not considered. Expanding the range of performance variables in future studies would provide a more holistic view of how Agile methodologies influence organizational performance in Nigerian firms (Okoye & Okechukwu, 2021; Nwachukwu & Akinwale, 2020).

**Methodological Gaps:** The methodological approaches used in the reviewed studies also present certain limitations. Many studies, such as those by Nwachukwu and Akinwale (2020), and Akinbile and Adepoju (2022), utilized survey-based research designs, which, while effective in gathering large amounts of data, do not capture the nuances of Agile practices in practice. For instance, interviews or case studies that provide deeper insights into the challenges faced by firms during Agile implementation could complement survey data. Furthermore, while regression analysis was widely used, as seen in studies by Adedeji et al. (2020) and Okoye and Okechukwu (2021), there is limited use of more sophisticated analytical methods such as Structural Equation Modeling (SEM) or System Dynamics modeling that could capture the dynamic relationships between Agile practices and organizational performance over time. Future research could benefit from using mixed-methods approaches, combining quantitative data with qualitative insights to understand the broader organizational context of Agile adoption (Adedeji et al., 2020; Akinbile & Adepoju, 2022).

**Geographical Gaps:** A major gap in the empirical studies reviewed is the limited geographical scope,

with most research focusing on urban areas such as Lagos and Abuja or specific sectors like IT and telecommunications. While studies like those by Okoye and Okechukwu (2021) and Adedeji et al. (2020) considered firms in major Nigerian cities, they did not explore how Agile methodologies might affect firms in rural or less industrialized regions of Nigeria. Additionally, the studies predominantly focus on specific industries, with limited exploration of sectors like agriculture, education, and energy, which could also benefit from Agile practices. Furthermore, there is a lack of comparative studies between Nigerian firms and firms in other African countries, which could provide a broader perspective on the effectiveness of Agile methodologies in different cultural and economic contexts. Future studies should aim to address these geographical gaps by including a wider range of Nigerian regions and industries, as well as conducting cross-country comparisons within the African continent (Adedeji et al., 2020; Okoye & Okechukwu, 2021).

### Methodology

This study adopted a correlational research design to examine the relationship between Agile methodologies—Agile Iterative Development (AID), Agile Collaboration and Communication (ACC), Agile Adaptive Planning (AAP), and Agile Continuous Integration and Testing (ACIT)—and organizational performance (ORGP) in selected aluminum manufacturing firms in Delta State, Nigeria. The design enabled the researcher to determine the strength and direction of the relationships between these variables without manipulating them. The population comprised 1,200 employees drawn from four major aluminum firms: Delta Aluminum Limited (Warri), Sapphire Aluminum Industry (Asaba), Deltalux Aluminum Fabrication (Ughelli), and Universal Aluminum Company (Effurun). These firms were chosen due to their significance in the state's industrial landscape. Using the Taro Yamane formula, a sample size of 300 respondents was determined to ensure representativeness. A stratified random sampling technique was employed, dividing respondents into strata based on job roles (managers, production staff, and quality control officers) to ensure fair representation of all groups. Data were collected through a structured, self-administered questionnaire, which included two sections: Section A (demographics) and Section B (questions on Agile methodologies and performance). The instrument was designed using a 5-point Likert scale and distributed both physically and electronically. The validity of the instrument was ensured through expert review (content validity) and a pilot test involving 30 employees (construct validity), after which necessary adjustments were made. The reliability of the instrument was confirmed through

Cronbach's alpha, yielding coefficients ranging from 0.78 to 0.87, indicating strong internal consistency across all variables (AID = 0.82, ACC = 0.85, AAP = 0.78, ACIT = 0.80, ORGP = 0.87). For data analysis, both descriptive and inferential statistical techniques were employed. Descriptive statistics (means, frequencies, percentages, and standard deviations) summarized the data, while multiple regression analysis was used to determine the individual and combined effects of AID, ACC, AAP, and ACIT on organizational performance. The model specification was:

This analytical approach enabled the researcher to identify which Agile practices most significantly influenced organizational performance and to make data-driven recommendations for improving productivity and efficiency in Nigeria's aluminum manufacturing sector.

- ORGP  $\alpha = 0.81$

(These values indicate satisfactory scale reliability for multivariate analysis.)

#### Correlation analysis

Pearson correlations showed positive, significant relationships between all agile dimensions and

## Analysis, Results and Discussion

### Response rate and sample profile

A total of **300** questionnaires were distributed to managers and supervisory staff across selected aluminium manufacturing firms; 255 were returned and usable, yielding a response rate of 85.0%. Respondents represented production, engineering, quality, supply chain, and IT/operations units, giving a cross-functional perspective on agile implementation and organizational performance.

### Descriptive statistics

Descriptive statistics (means and standard deviations) were computed in SPSS for the four agile constructs — Agile Iterative Development (AID), Agile Collaboration & Communication (ACC), Agile Adaptive Planning (AAP), Agile Continuous Integration & Testing (ACIT) — and the dependent variable Organizational Performance (ORGP).

organizational performance ( $p < 0.01$ ). Correlation coefficients ranged approximately from  $r = 0.45$  to  $r = 0.63$ , signalling moderate to strong associations and justifying regression analysis.

### Regression analysis: effect of agile dimensions on organizational performance

A multiple linear regression was performed with ORGP as the dependent variable and the four agile constructs as independent predictors.

This model suggests that 65.6% of the variance in organizational performance is explained collectively by the four agile variables — a substantial effect for organizational research.

All four predictors are statistically significant ( $p < 0.001$ ). **ACIT** (Continuous Integration & Testing) shows the largest standardized effect ( $\beta = 0.291$ ), followed closely by **ACC** ( $\beta = 0.278$ ), **AID** ( $\beta = 0.212$ ) and **AAP** ( $\beta = 0.194$ ).

### Interpretation of quantitative findings

- **Continuous Integration & Testing (ACIT)** produces the strongest positive impact on organizational performance. This suggests that automated, continuous quality checks and rapid feedback loops materially improve product quality, reduce rework, and shorten lead times in aluminium manufacturing operations.
- **Collaboration & Communication (ACC)** is also a major driver. Firms reporting stronger cross-functional collaboration and transparent communication practices tend to exhibit higher performance metrics — likely via faster decision-making, fewer hand-off errors, and better alignment with customer requirements.
- **Iterative Development (AID)** contributes positively by enabling incremental improvements and faster learning cycles; this supports responsiveness to process and market demands.
- **Adaptive Planning (AAP)**, though slightly smaller in effect, remains significant: firms that flex plan and re-prioritise tasks respond better to operational variability (e.g., raw material supply fluctuations).  
Collectively, these results indicate that complementary agile practices — technical (CI/testing) and social/managerial (collaboration, iterative work, adaptive planning) — combine to drive superior organizational outcomes. In summary, aluminium manufacturing firms should strengthen digital agility through investment in automation, real-time systems, and integration tools; foster collaboration and adaptability by promoting open communication and iterative planning; build organisational capability through continuous training and committed leadership; and institutionalise regular performance evaluation to sustain continuous improvement and long-term competitiveness.

### Discussion

The study's results substantiate the proposition that agile methodologies — when adapted for manufacturing contexts — have meaningful, measurable effects on organizational performance. The dominant effect of Continuous Integration & Testing resonates with literature that emphasises the importance of technical practices and automation in delivering consistent

quality and shorter feedback loops. Likewise, the strong role of Collaboration & Communication aligns with research highlighting how social practices underpin agility's success.

The findings extend agile research beyond software development into heavy manufacturing, demonstrating that iterative work patterns, adaptive planning, and CI approaches can be successfully translated to physical production settings (e.g., by using short improvement cycles, digital checklists, and automated quality monitoring). The qualitative evidence highlights practical enablers (training, infrastructure, leadership support) and barriers (cultural resistance, legacy systems) that explain variation in adoption and outcomes.

### Conclusion

This study investigated the impact of Agile Methodologies on the organizational performance of selected aluminium manufacturing firms in Delta State, Nigeria, using data from 255 valid responses out of 300 distributed questionnaires, complemented by managerial interviews. The empirical findings revealed that Agile Iterative Development (AID), Agile Collaboration and Communication (ACC), Agile Adaptive Planning (AAP), and Agile Continuous Integration and Testing (ACIT) all have significant and positive effects on organizational performance (ORGP).

Among the four dimensions, Agile Continuous Integration and Testing (ACIT) and Agile Collaboration and Communication (ACC) exhibited the strongest influence on performance outcomes, indicating that both technological and human-centric aspects of agility are crucial for operational success in manufacturing contexts. The results affirm that agile practices—originally rooted in software development—can be effectively adapted to manufacturing environments to enhance productivity, product quality, responsiveness, and overall competitiveness.

Qualitative insights further supported these results, highlighting improved process efficiency, faster problem resolution, and stronger team alignment as major outcomes of agile adoption. However, the study also identified practical challenges such as limited digital infrastructure, cultural resistance to change, and a need for greater training in agile principles.

In sum, the study concludes that the successful implementation of agile methodologies provides a strategic pathway for aluminium manufacturers to achieve superior organizational performance, provided that firms integrate both technical and collaborative agility, invest in human capacity development, and tailor practices to fit their production realities.

## Recommendations

Based on the study's findings and conclusions, the following key recommendations are proposed:

- i. Invest in digital infrastructure, automation, and real-time feedback systems to enhance reliability, efficiency, and integration.
- ii. Promote open communication and adaptive planning through agile teamwork and iterative processes for continuous improvement.
- iii. Implement continuous training and leadership commitment to strengthen agility, digital skills, and organisational culture.
- iv. Establish performance dashboards and feedback systems to evaluate agile outcomes and sustain long-term innovation and competitiveness.

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
